Voices from the past: Rev. Walter Dodds

Please enjoy Rev. Walter Dodds' newsletter message to this congregation from January, 1942. His exhortations to bring friends to church and to pray hold true for us today!

"Life is like a library filled with many books. Our days are the pages and the years the chapters. The Ithaca volume has, as yet, only recorded the events of chapter one and a few pages more, but every paragraph has been of challenging interest. So far in writing the book the minister's mistakes are not a few but however flagrant they have been he is appreciative of the way the Ithaca people have graciously overlooked the errors and omissions with patience and tolerance.

This year's new chapter is being written under the gloomy clouds of war and re-adjustment but somehow the light is not dim, for there is the light of Christ shining in the Christian church; a light that illuminates each step for those who stay near the Christ. The pastor needs his Christian friends in such a time for their beacons added one to the other are needed if he is to see clearly enough to write the current chapter in the gathering darkness.

Friends and members of the church often ask the minister what they as individuals can do for the work of our Master today. No general answer can be given for the gifts vary according to the individual. We do need **people**, and they are best won by the church through consistent recruiting by the membership. Bring your friends to the services of worship, and definitely invite them into our fellowship. Then, more than active service your church and your pastor need your prayers, and that is a contribution you each can make. The church can get along with a diminishing financial return but it will die without people and people's prayers.

For many years our church celebrated a special joint service on MLK Jr. weekend with our sister church, St. James AME Zion. In recent years this particular tradition has presented a difficult conflict for their minister, Rev. Terrance King, whose son's birthday falls at that same time.
